The MSAA (Midwest Ski Area Association) voiced a concern last spring about the current OEC program. Their concern is NOT to so-called "dummy it down" OEC. Their concern is to create a program that fits the needs of the Midwest Ski Area business model. What they are asking for is a program that meets the ANSI B77 standard. This creates a few challenges; what is this new program, does it fit the NSP model of OEC, do we have part "A" and part "B", and I'm sure there are many other questions to answer. What I do know, is that we the NSP, needs to figure out a solution. The Central Division is committed to define a solution with or without the help of the National Board. The National Board states they are willing to define a new program however, the National Chairman has

not shown a sense of urgency. MSAA is not willing to wait years for a solution.

This takes me to the next topic: The National Board election. The Central Division, has four great candidates for the National Board. The Central Division needs your help, I need your help. I need you to vote. I need you to get your fellow patrollers to vote. You ask why. First, we need board members that listen to our stake holders. The four candidates running from the Central Division all understand the concept of listening and creating solutions for our stake holders. All four listen to the membership. The Central Division needs representatives on the Board as we need to keep the Board in check with our stake holders and the membership. We need board members that want to and will work on the future of the NSP.

2016 CENTRAL DIVISION ELECTIONS NOTICE

Following the Policies & Procedures of the Central Division, the Central Division Director and two Region Directors, Eastern Michigan and South Central will be elected in 2016. One nomination form can be used for all of the elections. The nomination form located in this RPN may be used and sent to me by January 26, 2016 or the easiest method is to go to the Central Division website, find elections and fill out the form and submit, also by January 26, 2016. In addition, Section Chief Elections for Sections 2 and 5 should also take place this season. Section Chief Elections are run by each Region with the results reported to the Division Election Coordinator. All election processes and procedures can be found in the current Central Division Policies and Procedures which can be found on the Central Division website.

DIVISION DIRECTOR ELECTION

Selection of the Division Director is by an election conducted by the Central Division election Coordinator and in accordance with the Central Division Policies and Procedures the results of which are reviewed and confirmed by the Central Division Election Review Committee. The Division Director shall have the duties set forth in the NSP Policies and Procedures, provisions of the Central Division Bylaws and shall direct the day to day operations of the Central Division, maintain communications with the National Ski Patrol System, Inc., the Region Directors and the individual Registration Units of the Central Division. He shall call and conduct the meetings of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee and appoint the non-elected officers and advisors of the Central Division Staff and fill such vacancies as may from time to time occur.

Qualifications

1. Must be a registered NSP member for at least five years. Membership in an NSP registered Professional Division patrol shall constitute NSP membership.
2. Must have served one term as Region Representative or two terms as a Section Chief, or must have served as a Region, Division, or National Program Supervisor for at least two years.
3. Must be familiar with National policies and procedures as defined in the current NSP Policies and Procedures manual.
4. Must be familiar with the Division's policies and procedures, as applicable.
5. Must be registered in the Division as a Senior (Alpine, Nordic or Auxiliary) Patroller or Certified Patroller. (S09 P006)

Additional recommended (but not required) qualifications:

- Should have logged at least 80 days of active patrolling (excluding refreshers, tests, etc.) with one-third of these days at a ski area(s) in the Division.
- Should have experience working with management at a ski area in the Division and should have the endorsement of an area management representative in the Division.
- Should have actively participated in National level activities.

Responsibilities

1. Supports and fosters NSP mission statement.
2. Promotes NSP education programs within the Division; supports Division staff in managing the integrity of NSP training standards; and establishes an atmosphere for the exchange of skills, ideas, proposals, techniques, and informational programs between NSP members, ski areas, NSP Registration Units, and regions.
3. Maintains accurate records at the Division levels. Develops an annual budget and presents it to the Division board of directors. Prepares an annual report and presents it at the annual Division meeting.
4. Carries out policies and responsibilities as defined in the NSP Policies and Procedures manual and the Division's bylaws.

5. Establishes and maintains relationships with other organizations related to the involvement of Central Division members including, but not limited to the annual and semi-annual meetings of the National Ski Patrol Board of Directors, PSIA, AASI and MSAA.

NOMINATION PROCEDURE:

Nominations for Division Director Candidates may be made by any Central Division active patroller or by self-nomination. The nomination form can be found in this issue of the RPN or can be submitted from the Central Division website: www.nspcentral.org. Nomination forms must be received by the Division Election Coordinator by January 26, 2016. Nominees will be sent a "Candidate Information Sheet" that must be returned by February 9, 2016.

ELECTION PROCEDURE:

The Division Election Coordinator will verify qualifications of nominees, notify nominees of any deficiencies and collect nominee's resumes and/or position statements which will be distributed to the electorate along with voting instructions by February 15, 2016. Ballots must be returned by March 8, 2016. Tabulation of ballots by the Division Election Coordinator and validated by the Election Review Committee by March 19, 2016. Election results will be announced to the electorate and posted on the Division website by March 27, 2016. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes per an instant run-off vote process as detailed in Chapter 3 of the Central Division Policies and Procedures shall be declared the elected Central Division Director.

ELECTORATE:

The votes for the election of the Division Director shall consist of the following:

One vote for each elected Region Director, Section Chief and Patrol Representative of a Registration Unit in the Division. In addition, one additional elector for patrols with 51 to 100 members, two additional electors for patrols with 101 to 150 members, and three additional electors for patrols with over 150 members. The number of members is based on the June 30th membership of the previous year.

Each elector must be an active member of that patrol with two or more years of service in the Division. The names, addresses and email of these electors shall be made available to the Division Election Coordinator no later than January 15, 2016. Compliance shall be the responsibility of the Region Election Coordinator, or the Region Director if no Region Election Coordinator is appointed.

REGION DIRECTOR ELECTIONS

EASTERN MICHIGAN REGION/ SOUTH CENTRAL REGION

In accordance with the current Policies & Procedures of the Central Division, an election for the position of Region Director for Eastern Michigan and South Central regions will be held in the year 2016. The Region Director serves a three year term, administers the Region according to the Region's Bylaws and Policies and Procedures and reports directly to the Central Division Director.

Qualifications:

1. Must be a registered NSP member for at least five years
2. Must have served as a Section Chief, Patrol Representative, or National, Division or Region Program Supervisor/Administrator for at least two years.
3. Must be familiar with National policies and procedures as defined in the current NSP Policies and Procedures manual.
4. Must be familiar with the Region's policies and procedures, as applicable.
5. Must be registered in the Division as a Senior (Alpine, Nordic or Auxiliary) Patroller or Certified Patroller.

Responsibilities:

1. Supports and fosters NSP mission Statement.
2. Promotes and supports all NSP education programs within the Region to maintain the integrity of NSP training standards.
3. As a member of the Division Board of Directors, the Region Director is responsible for duties developed and designated by the Division Board of Directors.
4. Responsible for all aspects of the NSP programs and activities supported by the Region.
5. Promotes the financial support of the NSP and its programs.
6. Visits all areas with the Region during their term of office.
7. Submits an annual report to the Division Board of Directors.
8. Is responsible for communicating National and Division policies to Sections and NSP Registration Units, and is responsible for communicating NSP Registration Unit concerns to the Division Director and/or Division Program Supervisors.
9. Writes articles and reports for Division Newsletter.
10. Ensures that all Section and NSP Registration Units submit annual reports and financial reports in a timely manner.
11. Recommends individuals to the Division Program Supervisors, and in consensus with them, appoints individuals to serve as Region Program Administrators.
12. Monitors the performance and effectiveness of Region Program Administrators and recommends changes in concert with the Division Program Supervisor when appropriate.

NOMINATION PROCEDURE:

Nomination may be made by any Region active patroller in good standing or by self nomination.

The nomination form can be found in this issue of the RPN or can be downloaded from the Central Division website: www.nspcentral.org. Nomination forms must be received by the Division Election Coordinator by January 26, 2016. Nominees will be sent a "Candidate Information Sheet" that must be returned by February 9, 2016. All nominees must follow "Guidelines of Conduct for Candidates" found in the current Central Division Policies & Procedures.

ELECTION PROCEDURE:

The Division Election Coordinator will verify qualifications of nominees, notify nominees of any deficiencies and collect nominee's resumes and/or position statements which will be distributed to the electorate along with voting instructions by February 15, 2016. Ballots must be returned by March 8, 2016. Tabulation of ballots by the Division Election Coordinator and validated by the Election Review Committee by March 19, 2016. Election results will be announced to the electorate and posted on the Division website by March 27, 2016.

ELECTORATE:

The votes for the election of the Region Director shall consist of the following:

One vote for each Section Chief and Patrol Representative; one additional elector for patrols with 51 to 100 members, two additional electors for patrols with 101 to 150 members, and three additional electors for patrols with over 150 members. The number of members is based on the June 30th membership of the previous year.

Each elector must be an active member of that patrol with two or more years of service in the Division. The names, addresses and email of these electors shall be made available to the Division Election Coordinator no later than January 15, 2016. Compliance shall be the responsibility of the Region Election Coordinator, or the Region Director if no Region Election Coordinator is appointed.

Or

One vote for every registered member of the Region. If the one patroller one vote option is selected, the entire cost and operation of the election will be borne by the Region. The process and timing

for the election must be pre-approved in writing by the Central Division Election Coordinator. The process will be monitored and certified by the Division Election Coordinator.

Whichever population is used, the election outcome will be determined by a simple majority of the votes cast. If a tie occurs, it will be broken by the Division Director.

A List of Nordics

As Division Nordic Supervisor, I report to the Board. At the Fall Division meeting in Grand Rapids, I complained that I didn't even have a list of Nordic Patrollers, and that made it hard to talk to them all. My AD looked up, and said, "I think we can do that", and in a few days a list of all the Central Division Nordics appeared in my email. This may mean that the NSP database situation is improving; or it may just mean that I never asked the right person before. Whichever it is, the list is welcome. It's not perfect — I've found one incorrect registration, and at least one patroller missing — but it's very nice to have it.

It has lots of surprises for me. First, it's shorter than I expected: there are only 137 of us. The Western Region has more than any other region, with 38 Nordics in 7 different patrols. One of these patrols, Giants Ridge, is a downhill ski area, but it also has an extensive x-c trail network. There are 6 patrollers registered as Nordics with this Alpine patrol. This is something we only realized was possible a few years ago.

South Central has next most Nordics, with 25 patrollers in 5 patrols, while Southern has 22 patrollers in 9 patrols. Together, they cover southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois. Western Michigan has 18 Nordics, all in the same patrol — definitely a nice arrangement. Northern Michigan, on the other hand, has a lone Nordic patroller, all by himself. He has a secondary registration at a Nordic Patrol which apparently has no PR. I think I need to get in touch with him, as well as with several others in other regions who are similarly out of contact. And now I can!

It has been easiest for me to get to know patrollers living west of Lake Michigan, because a high percentage of them come to the Birkie, in northwest Wisconsin. This year it's on February 20, and yes, we need more patrollers — come join us if you can! Also in northern Wisconsin is our Division Nordic Workshop, January 9-11 in Minocqua. This is a two-day class in both Classic and Skate skiing, plus another day's class in Telemark. Look for more information on the Division website, under Programs/Nordic, to appear soon. Unfortunately, both of these events are pretty far away for anyone living east of the lake.

This year I'm going to try to get to some events east of the lake (far away for me), partly to improve contact with Michigan patrollers, and also just to widen my world. In particular, I'm pretty sure I can get to the White Pine Stampede, in the northern lower peninsula on February 6. The bigger American Vasa race conflicts with the Mora (MN) Vasaloppet, so I'll have to choose between them. If there are other events I should try to get to, let me know. A list of the major Nordic races which welcome visiting Nordic patrollers, with contact names, is another document that will appear soon on the Division website.

Here's wishing you a good season, with snow, not rain, and cold, but not too cold. Think snow!

Preparing for the Season...*"If you don't have a target, you just might hit it."*

Ponder with me for a moment...if you were going to climb Mt. Rainer in two months, would you want to be fit? (Strength, Altitude, Cardio, Pain Management, Mental Toughness, Geographic Familiarity) And, what are the costs for not being fit on a group climb? Frustration, suffering, inability to fulfill my role with the team, labored breathing, despair? I don't know about you, but those would be some of the outcomes for me.

Or, if you were scheduled to trek in an African Safari in November, would you begin researching, making a list and gathering belongings now? I'm going to believe that our answer is yes.

Snow will be falling in many of our regions very shortly; when we signed on to wear the cross, we basically took an oath to serve the ski/ride public with our special gifts, talents and training. Are we ready to fulfill our duty?

In my last article for the summer, I suggested the following, please re-read it.

Make a plan: *If you don't have a target, you just might hit it.*

- 1. Ask some of your PSIA/AASI colleagues this summer... "where can I improve, and what are the specific priorities in getting there?"*
- 2. Read: deepen your knowledge about ski/ride mechanics, personal progressions to focus on for the new season, or simply deepen your knowledge about alignment and ski/board snow interaction.*

- 4. Videos: fill your mind with good images, review some of your own skiing/riding with a colleague, and dream big about joyful turns.*
- 5. Program: schedule a preseason trip out west to get a jump on the season, and a few clinics back home to further deepen your skills. Develop a daily 30 minute warm up plan for your shift and then execute.*
- 6. Worldview: remind yourself and your friends, that's its a lifelong trip and though I won't get there tomorrow, I'm going to enjoy the ride getting there.*
- 7. Smile: it goes a long way and makes a big impression on the paying public.*

Let's take another step in that lifelong journey this year. We can be doing a lot right now to prepare for the upcoming season: OEC refreshing, equipment tuning/acquisition, fitness (core, core, core), and our overall readiness and goal setting for our ski/ride skills. None of us are exempt. We must all do our duty to ourselves, and for our teams, to be ready.





Bill continued his avalanche training and in 2005, became an Avalanche Level II instructor. Bill understood the dangers of avalanches and wanted other patrollers to become aware of these dangers. He did this by teaching level I classes at both local and region levels.

Bill continued to maintain a high level of patrol skills by participating in OEC, CPR, Toboggan Refreshers and Lift Evacuation Practices.

Bill stepped up when asked to be Section Chief for the late Southwest Region and continued as Section 6's Section Chief in Southern Region, after reorganization.

In his private life, Bill was a CPR instructor with The American Heart Association for 25+ years and Advanced Cardiac Life Support instructor for 12 years. He served with the Wild Lands and Forest Firefighter team battling forest fires in Colorado, Wyoming and Montana for over 6 years, was a paramedic and full time firefighter for 10 years and a volunteer firefighter for 15 years.

Bill never gave up when he started a project. He started his Senior Alpine quest in 1998, passing the senior OEC, passing the Alpine Skiing portion in 2013 and the Toboggan portion in 2014.

Bill was honored in May, 2015, when he received his National Appointment, #11660, shortly before his passing.

Bill was an outstanding patroller, instructor, leader and all round friend to all. He will be greatly missed.


